


END OF YEAR 1 IMPACT REPORT

WHAT'S OUT THERE...

Whilst it is important to ensure PSHE is part of a planned curriculum, it can also be used to address needs in a local context and form part of conversations we have with children and young people about their experiences and what's happening in the world around them.

We have collated some examples of topics that are being covered in TV and media that young people may want to discuss.



inEQE have sent out a <u>safeguarding alert</u> about a trend on TikTok around explicit images, details of the risks and guidance on next steps if someone makes a disclosure or names the challenge to you.

UN-backed Tech Against the Terrorism has raised <u>concerns</u> that some video games that simulate real-world terror attacks are being used to radicalise children and young people.



Channel 4 have created a 50 minutes factual drama "Consent" inspired by true events that capture the experiences of teenagers in an environment where sexual expectations are distorted by the instant access to pornography and where the lines of consent are minimised.

Chris Packham hosts a <u>two episode</u> series Inside Our Autistic Minds that enables a group of people with autism to create short films that reveal how they truly feel inside.

Alice, Darling is a film about coercive control currently available to buy on Sky Store and Amazon Prime.

In Hollyoaks, Imran will be returning to the village following his treatment for an eating disorder and Juliet continues her treatment for cancer.

The Whitney storyline on Eastenders, sees Whitney undergo a medical termination of pregnancy due to the baby having a life-limiting illness. The BBC Actionline signposts to <u>Information and Support around Pregnancy related issues</u>.



Newsround have produced a <u>special report</u> where some of Ukraine's children share their stories an year on from the Russian invasion.

UPDATE FROM NATIONAL PARTNERS

CHILD SEXUAL ABUSE (CSA) E-LEARNING

A new CSA report from the Centre of Expertise on Child Sexual Abuse shows a significant improvement in the identification of child sexual abuse including a 15% increase in concerns of children being sexually abused, mirrored by a 15% rise in recorded offences of child sexual abuse, although there is concern about the growing time taken for reported CSA offences to proceed through the criminal justice system.

The CSA Centre are offering a <u>free</u>, <u>accessible 90 minute e-learning course</u> on identifying and responding to intra-familial Child Sexual Abuse. The course seeks to help professionals recognise when children might be showing them that something is wrong and understand how to help.

ASH AND SMOKE-FREE SHEFFIELD: YOUTH VAPING

ASH and Smoke-free Sheffield have produced a range of free resources which were developed in response to requests for help in dealing with youth vaping. They are designed to support carers and educators, including PSHE and safeguarding leads, to have evidence-based conversations and enable children and young people to make informed decisions about smoking and vaping. Included are:

- A letter to introduce the materials to schools, colleges and safeguarding leads which can be amended to suit individual areas, logos added etc.
- Two posters which can be displayed where students will see them, in school toilets, classrooms, canteens, and noticeboards. Both digital and printed versions are available.
- A short, animated film which can be used in PSHE lessons, form times and assemblies, to start discussions.
- Classroom presentation for use by teachers alongside the animated film to guide discussions.
- Teachers Toolkit to support educators, helping answer questions and signpost students to additional support.
- Electronic leaflet for parents and carers about smoking and vaping which can be shared via newsletters or emails, for example.





STATE OF THE NATION 2022: CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S WELLBEING

The Department for Education has published a report on the wellbeing of children and young people over the academic year 2021 to 2022. Capturing the voice and views of children and young people is key in for best practice PSHE, responding to needs within our local context and is reflecting the experiences of the children and young people that we support.

Key findings from the report are:

· Children's wellbeing appears to have bounced back from its lowest point during the pandemic in 2020, to a level closer to pre-pandemic levels

Both primary and secondary pupil's anxiety levels is higher than it was in 2020-2021

• Rates of obesity in Year 6 remain higher than before the pandemic

 23% of parents of children and young people at primary school report being bullied in the last 12 months - and that 1 in 8 11-16 years old and 1 in 7 17-24 years old reported they have been bullied online.

Eating problems remain higher than pre-COVID.

 Most secondary-aged children and young people indicated positive feelings about schools, relationships with peers and school staff

Newsround has produced a special report "Inside my Head: Taking Control of my Anxiety".

Anna Freud National Centre for Children and Families has lots of resources to support schools around mental health.

LEGAL AGE OF MARRIAGE



We previously highlighted an upcoming change in the law around the legal age of marriage, this has now come into practice. From 27th February, a new law (Marriage and Civil Partnership (Minimum Age) Act) increasing the legal age of marriage to 18 came into force in England and Wales.

Previously people could get married at 16 or 17 if they had parental consent and there was no law against ceremonies for younger children which were not registered with local councils. The new legislation also covers non-legally binding ceremonies.

Those found guilty of the offence face up to seven years in prison. Please ensure that any resources you use around marriage and civil partnerships reflects this change in law.

The change in law has come about to protect vulnerable children from being forced into marriage so it is important that they have the knowledge on this change in the law.

REVEALING REALITY

CHILDREN'S MEDIA LIVES 2022

This <u>report</u> produced for OFCOM provides a comprehensive picture of children's media experiences in 2021. The Children's Media Lives project follows, as far as possible, the same group of children aged 8 to 18, conducting filmed interviews each year to learn about their media habits and attitudes. This year the sample was increased from 18 to 21, to allow the exploration of the media lives of children in a wider range of circumstances, including additional vulnerabilities.

Key Findings:

The majority of children felt better about their lives than in 2020 TikTok was still the most popular platform

Use of social media has changed to be more passive and less 'social'
Most participants did not understand the safety features on the platforms they used

WITHOUT CONSENT - NUDE IMAGE-RELATED ABUSE

A new <u>report</u> funded by the Home Office explores nude image-related behaviours and the experiences of image-based abuse including the creation of nude images without consent, the sharing on or posting online of nude images without consent, coercive behaviours involving nude images (including coercion to create nude images and coercion involving threats of sharing nude images or posting them online.

The research highlights misunderstandings about what constitutes abusive behaviour. PSHE education on consent, coercion and signs and features of abuse are critical to safeguard children and young people.

Internet Watch Foundation and Childline (Report Remove) provide support around child sexual images. Locally New Era are the commissioned service that provides supports to those affected by domestic abuse.

SEXUAL ABUSE IMAGERY

The Internet Watch Foundation has stated that since 2019, there has been a 1,058% increase in the number of webpages showing sexual abuse images and videos of children aged 7-10 years old who have been recorded via an internet connected device, often by someone who has contacted the child online. The NSPCC carried out a freedom of information request to UK police forces and found a 66% increase in child abuse image offences recorded by UK police in the past 5 years

High quality PSHE education is important to enable children and young people to recognise signs of grooming, develop strategies to respond and know where they can access support.

The UK Safer Internet Centre has free teaching toolkits to support delivering online safety.

<u>ProjectEVOLVE</u> provides a toolkit that contains resources suitable for Early Years through to 18. Outcomes and competencies are mapped to age and progression with a search function to help navigation.

ABUSIVE RELATIONSHIPS



Safe Lives has published <u>research</u> that looked to explore how and why young people begin to use abusive behaviours in their relationships, to better understand what is meant to be on the 'verge of harming' and to look at what support for young people who harm should look like.

More than 850 young people shared their experiences about using harmful behaviours and 10 practitioners provided insight into supporting those who harm.

30% of people who completed the survey said they had used harmful behaviours in a relationship, providing a range of reasons for doing so including trust issues, emotional dysregulation, adverse experiences, reaction/response, power and control.

BBC Teach has a <u>video</u> that discusses the six types of abuse and their characteristics.

BBC Teach also has another <u>video</u> that explores coercive control (for 15+)

Women's Aid has a toolkit suitable for all ages - Expect Respect.

PORNOGRAPHY REGULATION: THE CASE FOR PARLIAMENTARY REFORM

An All-Part Parliamentary Group on Commercial Sexual Exploitation has published a <u>report</u> into their inquiry into Pornography regulation: The Case for Parliamentary reform. The inquiry outlines laws relating to pornography and key findings include:

- Those who view pornography are more likely to be male
- · Violence against women is prolific in mainstream pornography
- · Illegal content is freely accessible on mainstream pornography websites
- · Pornography fuels sexual violence
- · Pornography fuels social and political harms against women and girls
- · Mainstream websites perpetuate racist stereotypes
- · Exposure to pornography by young people is high
- · Sexual coercion is inherent to the commercial production of pornography

The PSHE Association has produced <u>guidance</u> to enable PSHE Leads to address the requirement for secondary schools to teach that 'sexually explicit material, e.g. pornography, presents a distorted picture of sexual behaviours, can damage the way people see themselves in relation to others and negatively affect how they behave towards sexual partners' as part of statutory Relationships and Sex Education at secondary.

The guidance also explores the key role primary educators play in laying the foundations for secondary teaching by covering personal safety, respect in different types of relationships and media and digital literacy.

APPS TO BE AWARE OF



INEQE have completed an investigation into the app JusTalk and have created a <u>comprehensive guide</u> for professionals working with children and young people that outlines what they app is, whether the JusTalk app is safe and top tips to mitigate any risks it poses to children and young people.



There are reports that perpetrators of Child Exploitation and Grooming are using the Life 360 app which is used for location sharing and tracking.

UPDATE FROM LOCAL PARTNERS



SAFER SLEEP AWARENESS

In Staffordshire and Stoke-on-Trent, we have continued to see babies die where there are avoidable risks in the sleep environment that may have had an impact. We know that families are given information about safe sleep for their baby, but there is a need to create further awareness.

The Staffordshire and Stoke on Trent Integrated Care Board would like to invite primary schools and early years settings in Staffordshire and Stoke-on-Trent to commit to joining Pyjama Day, with children coming into school wearing their pyjamas, and schools and early years using the opportunity to share provided resources about safer sleep advice to families.

In addition, we have written an assembly for Primary Schools setting to outline the purpose of Pyjama Day which you can access <u>here</u> along with a <u>resource guide</u>.

A <u>lesson plan</u> and <u>supporting PowerPoint</u> for KS4 has been created to support more in depth discussions about safer sleep for babies and raise the awareness of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS).

NSPCC SCHOOLS SERVICE -STAFFORDSHIRE AND STOKE-ON-TRENT SPRING UPDATE — FEBRUARY 2023

SPEAK OUT. STAY SAFE. ONLINE PROGRAMME

We continue to offer this programme to all primary schools.

Updated programme details:

Speak out. Stay safe. online is available to all primary schools, with no cost to the school. Featuring Ant and Dec and our mascot, Buddy, this programme includes child-friendly video assemblies and supporting classroom resources for children in KS1 and KS2.

NSPCC

The programme aims to help children:

- · understand abuse in all its forms and recognise the signs of abuse
- understand that abuse is never a child's fault, and they have the right to be safe
 know how to get help, and the sources of help available to them, including our Childline service.

SCHOOL VISITS AND WORKSHOPS

We are delighted that our Schools Service volunteers are now visiting primary schools again, delivering workshops to Y5 and Y6 classes where capacity allows. These workshops reinforce the Speak out. Stay safe. key safety messages of recognising abuse and speaking to trusted adults.

Our current number of volunteers is low so we cannot offer visits to all schools.

We are currently able to offer this to some schools in the following areas:

SPEAK OUT. STAY SAFE. SEND PROGRAMME

We continue to offer this programme to all special schools and all mainstream schools.

Updated programme details:

The SEND programme consists of a series of 6 sessions to be delivered by school staff. It is most suitable for use with pupils aged 9-11 with moderate learning disabilities, autism spectrum conditions and other additional learning needs, but can be easily adapted to use with a wider group of ages and needs.

The focus is to help children learn about their own emotions, to recognise signs of abuse and to develop awareness of healthy and unhealthy relationships. It teaches children that their school is a safe place and helps them identify trusted adults they can talk to about their worries. It covers aspects of personal wellbeing including emotional intelligence, communication skills, self-esteem and self-awareness.

TALK PANTS MAKATON

The recently launched Talk PANTS Makaton teaching resources include videos and prompt cards to help support children who use Makaton to understand the PANTS rules.

TALK RELATIONSHIPS

Secondary schools can now sign up to the Talk Relationships programme for free (for a limited time). Talk Relationships is for secondary-age educators to ensure that young people can learn about sex and relationships in a safe environment that recognises, responds to, and prevents abuse.

The resource includes an eLearning course for school staff and a series of 14 age-appropriate lesson plans, covering topics such as consent and harmful sexual behaviour.

ONLINE SAFETY GUIDANCE TO PARENTS AND CARERS

Staffordshire Police has been sharing posters from National Online Safety to support parents and carers to be aware of different platforms and tips on how to have open discussions about digital lives. They want to encourage education settings to share these resources with their parents and carers.



ARMY CADETS EDUCATION OFFER

Both the City Council and the Army Cadets Force are ambitious to increase the number of detachments in the city so that more young people can benefit from the opportunities and experiences that being a member of the Cadets Force can bring.

There are currently eight detachments in Stoke-on-Trent and North Staffordshire and the ambition is to grow that by at least another three units in the next two years. The Army Cadets for recognise that the best way to grow new units is for them to be hosted by and attached to existing anchor institutions – schools, colleges, youth organisations – and they would like the opportunity to talk to you about how that can be made possible and bring real and enduring value to the bost institution.





SCVYS and the Stoke-on-Trent and Staffordshire Violence Reduction Alliance (VRA) want to engage with children and young people aged 11-25 years old in Staffordshire and Stoke-on-Trent to understand their views, concerns and experiences of violence (including in their local area and via digital/social media) and what they would like to see put in place to help them feel safe. The findings of the engagement will:

- · Inform the development of the new Violence Reduction Strategy;
- Identify support required locally for young people
- · Help shape future awareness campaigns relating to community safety

How will the information be used?

The questions should take no longer than 10-12 minutes to complete and young people do not have to give any personal details. The information they provide will be used to produce a written report that will be shared with the VRA. The final report will be available to view on the VRA website later in the year.

The <u>survey</u> closes at midnight on Sunday 16th April 2023 and we welcome your support in enabling young people to participate and share their views. either during tutorial, PSHE lesson or by advertising the opportunity via this <u>poster</u> or this <u>one</u> being displayed around the building.

EFFECTIVE PRACTICE EARLY HELP TRAINING

The Effective Practice Coordination team have shared dates for one-day training sessions which support staff to have a clear understanding of what is involved when providing Early Help to families.

The course covers considers all aspect of providing Early Help support from consent to restorative approaches.

The training would support any professional providing early intervention support to families, including (but not limited to); School home-school link workers, Safeguarding officers from schools, colleges and alternative provisions, Members of a school inclusion team, Education Welfare Officers, Workers in early years settings such as nurseries.

Session objectives:

By the end of the session, participants will be able to:

RESOURCES

KNIFE CRIME & YOUTH VIOLENCE

In response to recent incidents locally, we are keen to provide education settings with resources that can support conversations in relation to early intervention and prevention of youth violence and knife crime. Within the partnership, discussions have taken place about the need for resources linked to consequential thinking. The Ben Kinsella Trust Consequences of knife crime lesson pack for KS2 and Choice & Consequence lesson pack for KS4 support learning around identifying and managing risk and the impact of knife crime on communities.

The UK Trauma Council has created <u>resources to support educational communities</u> with <u>responding to traumatic events that affect children and young people</u> in their care. The resources include guidance, a policy framework, and a set of lesson plans.

Work is taking place and ongoing within the multi-agency partnership to ensure a pro-active, planned response to these emerging issues.



The Stoke-on-Trent Community Safety Partnership have funded an opportunity for settings (KS3+) to access a Virtual Reality education experience by Round Midnight over the next 6 months (as demonstrated at the Stoke CSP Schools Event in November 2022.)

The workshop is facilitated by trained professionals from Staffordshire Police, Youth Offending Service & Family Support.



Schools are asked to identify 10 students for the workshop which is delivered on your site, lasting 1-1.5 hours. There are a series of lesson plans to follow this workshop that you will also have access to.

STRESS AWARENESS MONTH 1-30 APR

The recently published <u>State of the Nation 2022</u>: children and <u>young people's wellbeing research report</u> cites that recent qualitative work from the ONS demonstrates that children and young people understand that having good mental and physical health allows them to do the things they enjoy, as well as the importance of recognising and managing stressors, and getting enough sleep, for mental and physical health (ONS, 2020).

Mentally Healthy Schools and the Anna Freud National Centre for Children and Families have created two toolkits - <u>one for primary schools</u>, and <u>one for secondary schools</u>. In the toolkits, they have collected together a number of resources for pupils and staff, to help you and the young people you work with manage and cope when stress becomes overwhelming.

As we approach exam season, it's important to recognise that pressure to do well in exams can be overwhelming and affect young people's mental health. The <u>Young Minds website</u> provides tips for young people including; <u>dealing with exam stress</u>, <u>the importance of selfcare</u>, <u>revision tips</u> and <u>dealing with disappointing exam results</u>

WORLD AUTISM ACCEPTANCE WEEK 27 MAR-2 APR

The World Autism Acceptance Week theme for 2023 is colour, and invite schools to try a new virtual challenge, the <u>Spectrum Colour Challenge</u> to get your fundraising off to a colourful start.

For settings who support children and young people with Autism and their families, Ambitious about Autism have created a range of <u>practical resources</u>, <u>including templates and posters</u>, that parents and autistic young people can download and use to support their health and wellbeing including; a visual story about how to look after your wellbeing during the cost of living crisis, daily & weekly routine planners and tips for families on managing health anxiety.

On the BBC Iplayer, Chris Packham hosts a <u>two episode series Inside Our Autistic Minds</u> that enables a group of people with autism to create short films that reveal how they truly feel inside. Clips could be used as part of classroom discussions.



World Health Day this year marks the 75th anniversary of the <u>World Health</u> <u>Organisation</u>.

Public Health England has a <u>toolkit</u> "Our Healthy Year" for Primary children (4-11 years) that help create a healthy, active school culture by developing healthier habits and encouraging healthier choice.

Public Health England has a <u>lesson plan</u> for Key Stage 3 and 4 (11-16 years old) that explores the link between physical and mental wellbeing.

AYPH has produced a PSHE Association Quality Marked <u>resource</u> around a fair and equal opportunity to enjoy good health for Key Stages 3-5 (11-18).

NATIONAL STEPHEN LAWRENCE DAY 22 APR



The Stephen Lawrence Day Foundation have a range of classroom resources available on their website:

- <u>Early Years, Foundation Stage and Key Stage 1</u> assemblies and resources cover topics such as 'Wonderful me' and 'Why am I special like Stephen' which celebrate respect and kindness, recognising differences.
- <u>Primary School/KS2</u> activities aim is to encourage children to discuss how they contribute to living in a fair and just society.
- <u>Secondary School/KS3-4</u> materials support students to engage through open discussions to think about making the right choices, and how they can feel empowered to go forward and make a difference in their communities.
- <u>Post 16 & KS5</u> sessions focus on challenging racism, making positive contributions to society, truth, fairness and respect for all as well as learning more about unconscious bias how they can stand up to racism in their own communities and work places.

A range of short clips from the series "Stephen: The Murder that Changed a Nation" are available to watch, and are detailed on the <u>Stephen Lawrence Day website</u>. Schools and communities can use these to supplement or follow up Stephen Lawrence Day activities.



LAUNCHES NEW RESOURCE

Catch22 recently provided <u>input</u> into the cross-party Parliamentary Education Committee about how recruitment methods were changing and adverts were being put on Instagram and Snapchat that resemble professional job adverts to groom children and young people into County Lines.

At Catch22, we believe that exploitation is a subject that needs to be tackled directly and early with children and young people, as supported by recent research from the <u>NWG</u> and the <u>Safeguarding Network</u>:

All results had the commonality of identifying education as playing an important role in prevention and early intervention.

We need PSHE lessons in school which explicitly teach about risks of exploitation"

Catch On is a free educational resource about Child Exploitation aimed at Years 7 & 8. The resource contains a suite of options for a single lesson or series of lessons exploring the topic of grooming and exploitation. Materials include lesson slides with embedded links and videos; comprehensive lesson plan guidance with photocopiable activity sheets; a handbook for parents and professionals.

The resource complements and adds to the excellent County Lines resources produced in Stoke-on-Trent and Staffordshire by the PSHE Coordinators which were utilised by the Catch22 working group who devised the resource including the <u>Criminal Exploitation & PSHE Professional's Pack</u>.

"We created this resource because we know how important prevention and early intervention are in the fight against child exploitation. Too often, children are referred to Catch22 when they have already suffered harm. Too often, we are only invited into schools once exploitation has been identified. We want to empower children with the knowledge and information they need to spot the signs of exploitation before they come to harm, and we need to inform the adults around them so they can keep children safe."

FREE 'WOMEN'S SAFETY' LESSON PACK
