
WHAT'S OUT THERE

Whilst it is important to ensure PSHE is part of a planned curriculum, it can also be used to address needs in a local context and form part of conversations we have with children and young people about their experiences and what's happening in the world around them.

We have collated some examples of topics that are being covered in TV and media that young people may want to discuss.

- Netflix is showing a documentary as Will Ferrell invites his transgender friend Harper Steele on a road trip across the USA so they can figure out what impact Harper's transitioning will mean for their friendship. <u>Will & Harper</u> is available on Netflix now.
- Panorama featured an <u>episode that focused on children's use of</u> <u>smartphones</u>. The episode follows two families and looks at the impact when their smartphones are removed for a week.
- <u>Living Every Second: The Kris Hallenga Story</u> aired on BBC two earlier this week and is available on Iplayer. The founder of Coppafeel, who died from breast cancer earlier this year following a late diagnosis and was determined to stop it happening to others.
- The <u>BBC reports</u> that the number of adults in England to have started vaping despite never having been regular smokers has reached one million, scientists estimate. The rise is driven mostly by young adults with about one out of every seven 18-24-year-olds who never regularly smoked now using e-cigarettes.
- The Israel-Gaza war continues to dominate the news. Our <u>special edition</u> <u>PSHE Digest</u> contains useful resources to support conversation with children and young people about the conference.
- The <u>stoke sentinel</u> has reported that a man from Congleton has been jailed for sending sexually explicit images to a child.
- A <u>Headteacher from Wolverhampton</u> has said that the national curriculum does not teach children enough about getting out of difficulty in open water, a headteacher has said.
- <u>YouTube is to stop recommending videos to teenagers</u> that idealise specific fitness levels, body weights or physical features. Whilst it will still allow 13-17 years old to view the videos, it's algorithms will not push young users down related content "rabbit holes"
- <u>Instagram has overhauled the way it works</u> for teenagers, turning on many privacy setting by default for all under 18s, including making their content unviewable to people who don't follow them, and making them actively approve all new followers. Users aged 13-15 years will be able to adjust the settings by adding a parent or guardian to their account.

UPDATE FROM NATIONAL PARTNERS

PREVENTING RACIST BULLYING

We've had several schools contact us directly asking for support following the impact of the racists, xenophobic and Islamophobic violent disorder seen over the summer.


Schools play a crucial role in, and are legally bound to, foster safe and inclusive environments, where children and young people feel respected and valued regardless of their race, religion, or ethnicity.

As part of our partnership working, the Pan-Staffordshire PSHE Education Service attends the Hate Crime Partnership Meeting, chaired by Staffordshire Police, with representatives from the districts and boroughs of the county, Stoke-on-Trent Local Authority, USAH and more. At last month's meeting it was highlighted that under 18's are the highest represented age range of people who are offenders or suspects in Hate Crimes and non-crime incidents over the past 12 months.


This is compared with the 30-39 years old being the highest reported age-range for victims.

The Anti-Bullying Alliance has written a <u>blog for schools</u> to help handle conversations and prevent racist bullying in schools. One of the key pieces of advice is that handling conversations about racism and preventing racist bullying is an ongoing process that requires commitment from all staff through a whole-school approach. By creating a supportive environment, educating pupils, and taking decisive action against racism, schools can play a pivotal role in shaping a more inclusive society.

Our <u>Resource Library</u> - Similarities and Differences contains resources for use in the classroom including from Educate Against Hate, Show Racism the Red Card and our own locally created resources with USAH.

DEPARTMENT FOR EDUCATION UPDATES

The Department for Education (DfE) has stated they received 14,000 responses to the consultation of the new draft guidance for Relationships Sex and Health Education (RSHE). They are taking these into consideration before deciding next steps. As stated in the last PSHE Digest schools do not need to change their approach and the current guidance remains in place to inform curriculum and delivery.

The DfE has <u>published research</u> exploring how schools have implemented the <u>statutory</u> <u>guidance</u> for relationships, sex and health education.

The survey was conducted with 2,510 teachers, RSHE co-ordinators, and leaders in primary and secondary schools followed. Qualitative case studies were conducted in 14 schools including interviews with 14 co-ordinators, 37 teachers, and 39 pupils.

We will be looking at the findings as part of our future planning for the PSHE Education service.

The DfE has also published a research report "<u>Teaching relationships education to prevent</u> <u>sexual abuse</u>" which highlights the need to have a comprehensive curriculum, an effective training plan in place to support teachers to handle sensitive topics and create a safe learning environment, the importance of engaging parents/carers in the education process to reinforce learning at home and establish support systems for children and young people who may be affected by the topics discussed.

The DfE's <u>statutory guidance</u> highlights that Relationships Education, RSE and Health Education must be accessible for all pupils. This is particularly important when planning teaching for pupils with special educational needs and disabilities who represent a large minority of pupils. High quality teaching that is differentiated and personalised will be the starting point to ensure accessibility. Schools should also be mindful of the preparing for adulthood outcomes, as set out in the SEND code of practice, when teaching these subjects to those with SEND.

The Universal SEND Services programme brings together support for SEND in schools with support for SEND in schools, with support for SEND across further education, with the ambition of improving preparation for adulthood from the earliest years in a seamless, joined up way.

The programme is funded by the Department for Education so that we can deliver free-toaccess SEND CPD for the entire education workforce.

What is available?

- <u>Teacher Handbook: SEND</u> key reference resource for any professional who wants to embed inclusive practice.
- <u>Online SEND CPD units</u> 19 one-hour units that explore some of the most commonly observed barriers to learning.
- Mental Wellbeing Hub relevant for children, young people and professionals
- <u>Specialist Spotlight Sessions</u> live online discussions often feature the specialists involved in the development of the units and are a great space in which to build on learning, share experiences and seek advice.

Finally, in December 2023 the non-statutory guidance on gender-questioning children was shared for consultation. The Government received 15,000 responses and will publish its response or final guidance in due course. In the meantime Brook offer an e-learning course that includes advice that is pupil-centre, focuses on safety and wellbeing of children and is compliant with school's public sector equality duty. The cost of the course is £35 and you can <u>enrol here</u>.

INTERNET SAFETY

The Internet Watch Foundation (IWF) has <u>published a news story</u> about an increase in the number of younger children exposed to sextortion in the UK. New data shows that in the first six months of 2024, child sexual abuse reports related to sexual extortion were up 19% compared to the same period in 2023. There was a increase in reports involving 14-15 years old (25%) and involving girls (2,600% increase).

The IWF has called for the government to bring forward legislation to ensure AI nudifying technology is not available to UK-based users.

NSPCC Learning has published a <u>briefing on young people's experiences of online sexual</u> <u>extortion</u>. Drawing from contacts to Childline and the NSPCC's helpline in 2023/2024, the briefing explores: how sextortion occurs and how it can escalate; the impact on young people's mental wellbeing; how to spot the signs; and how to talk to young people who may be at risk. It also provides guidance for reporting and preventing incidents of sextortion.

As a reminder sexual extortion or "sextortion" is where a criminal will coerce or trick a child or young person into sharing nude or sexual imagery, often whilst pretending to be someone else, then threaten to share the image(s) with the child/young person's friends and family, or the open web, if money is not sent.

Children and young people, during relevant PSHE sessions, should be reminded about <u>Report</u> <u>Remove</u>, a service which helps young people under the age of 18 years to confidentially report sexual images of themselves and remove them from the internet.

Child of the North and Centre for Young Lives have published a report of children's access to digital technology in the UK, digital literacy and how to close the digital divide. The report finds that 42% of young people do not have access to home broadband or a laptop/desktop computer yet 88% of young people think that digital skills will be essential to their careers. The report calls for evidence-based approaches to help children navigate digital content critically and responsibly. Recommendations to government include: a 'Minimum Digital Living Standards' framework; enhancing digital inclusivity in schools through continuing professional development (CPD) for educators; and creating a national Digital Creativity Skills Commons.

The Lucy Faithfull Foundation has <u>published a new paper</u> on the use of warning messages and chatbots to help prevent online child sexual abuse. The paper evaluates the chatbot tool designed to confront and redirect people searching for child sexual abuse images online. Findings from the experiment carried out through an online adult pornography website show: the warning message and chatbot did have a deterrent effect and when the chatbot was turned off for a month, searches for child sexual abuse images increased. The Foundation is calling for technology companies to focus on earlier prevention, such as warning messages, wider education, and clear expectations of user behaviour.

UNESCO has updated their <u>AI competency framework for students</u>. This publication aims to help educators integrating artificial intelligence learning objectives into official school curricula to prepare students to be responsible and creative citizens in the era of AI. They have also developed an <u>AI Competency Framework for teachers</u>.



MENTAL HEALTH

The briefing highlights: the importance of understanding how suicide in young people often follows the accumulation of different vulnerabilities and adversities; the need to hear children's voices and understand their experiences of the world; and the importance of promoting positive,

TRANSITIONS

The Children's Society has <u>published a report</u> that examines the well-being of children and important educational transitions in England and Wales, during schools years associated with educational transitions (comparing years 6 and 7,9 and 10, and 11 and 12).

Analysing data collected from their annual household surveys in 2022 and 2023, the report reveals connections between pivotal educational changes and the subjective well-being of children and young individuals.

The report recommends:

- Enhancing support during the transition from primary to secondary school.
- Improving the experiences of year 10 students.
 Addressing the growing gap in well-being between girls and boys within educational settings.

Anna Freud has an <u>animation and accompanying toolkit</u> to support young people who have recently started Year 7, or will be preparing to transition to secondary'school later in the year. They have been developed in collaboration with young people, teachers and mental health experts.

HOMELESSNESS

Article 39 has created a <u>new resource for young people</u> aged 16 and 17 who are homeless or threatened with homelessness. The resource provides guidance on the rights of young people have and information around:

- help from the local authority's children's services
- being looked after by a local authority
- getting help from an advocate

We have resources that explore myths about homelessness and the lived realities available within the Homelessness section of our <u>Resource Library</u>.

TERMINATION SERVICES

From 31st October <u>safe access buffer zones will be in force</u> around abortion clinics to bring in stronger safeguards for women accessing services. the Home Office has announced.

Safe access buffer zones will make it illegal for anyone to do anything that intentionally or recklessly influences someone's decision to use abortion services, obstructs them, or causes harassment or distress to someone using or working at these premises. The law will apply within a 150 metre radius of the abortion service provider.

Anyone found guilty of breaking the law will face an unlimited fine. The College of Policing and Crown Prosecution Service will publish guidance for police and prosecutors ahead of 31 October, to ensure there is clarity and consistency with the enforcement of the new offence.

The relevant zones also need to be on or next to a public highway or road, in an open space to which the public has access, or within the area of land attached to an abortion clinic, or in a location that is visible from any of those areas.

The measure applies to any clinics and private hospitals that are approved under the Abortion Act 1967, and for any NHS hospital that has given notification in the current or previous calendar year that it has carried out abortions.

SEXUAL HEALTH

The Faculty of Sexual and Reproductive Healthcare (FSRH) announced the re-launch of the <u>Contraception Choices website</u>. Developed by a team of doctors, nurses and researchers from University College London, in collaboration with young women, Contraception Choices aims to help people decide which method of contraception might suit them best. This is through information based on research evidence and theory, professional guidelines and user views and experiences of contraception.

The website also has a resources for teachers including a 1 hour evidence-based session on contraception for secondary school Relationships and Sex Education teaching. The lesson plan highlight's how sections of the Contraception Choices website can be used to support interactive discussions. This has been added to our <u>Resource Library</u> under "Contraception"

Brook also has a web resource called <u>Best contraception for me</u> which is an interactive tool to help young people find their method of choice and is endorsed by the FSRH.

Brook has also <u>created a lesson</u> aimed at Year 8 (12-13 years) that explores different methods and considerations when choosing contraction and where to get help with making decisions. (<u>resources and answer sheet</u>). These have been added to the <u>Resource Library</u> in our Contraception section.

These resources should be included in your signposting information when delivering sessions around sexual health and contraception.

The Sex Education Forum has created a <u>new, free Easy Read guide</u> that gives a definition of sexual health using pictures and accessible language. The tool can be useful to build a shared understanding of sexual health by:

- Introducing the topic of sexual health, especially to young people with SEND
- Outlining your approach to parents and carers
 Getting feedback from young people on gaps in learning

UPDATED PANTS RESOURCES

The NSPCC and PSHE Association have updated its <u>Talk PANTS resource</u> for nurseries and primary schools to help keep children safe from sexual abuse. The updates include a presentation of the Underwear Rule to use with 3-5 years olds. We have updated the link in the resource library.



KNIFE CRIME

From 24th September it became illegal to possess, sell, hire, manufacture, import, or supply zombie-style knives and machetes across the UK. This expansion of the Criminal Justice Act 1988 (Offensive Weapons) adds these dangerous items to the list of prohibited offensive weapons..

The national amnesty we shared details of in last month's Digest saw over 100 knives handed in locally.

Research, both nationally and locally reveals that many children carry knives out of fear for their safety, and the widespread sharing of zombie knife images and videos on social media only fuels this dangerous cycle. Enforcing this ban can help cut off the supply and, hopefully, reduce demand.



Banning these knives won't end knife crime overnight. Universal PSHE supported by targeted support can show children and young people that carrying a knife is not the answer.

In view of this change to the legislation, we have taken the opportunity to review and update our <u>Knife Crime and PSHE Professional's Pack</u> designed to give education professionals the information they require to feel more confident in their own knowledge base.

Ditch the Blade Week takes place 11-17th November so there will be an increase in messaging about knife crime across social media channels from partners. Please feel free to use our <u>Resource in the Library</u> to help support these messages.

DRIVING THEORY E-LEARNING

LEADERSHIP FOR CHANGE COMPETITION

The Economist Education Foundation has shared a new six-lesson curriculum and competition, created in partnership with Rolex to educate and empower the next generation of leaders.

<u>Leadership for Change</u> equips 10- to 16-year-olds with key critical-thinking, creative problem-solving and communication skills. Students will learn from a diverse group of inspiring leaders and apply the leadership skills they develop to challenges in their own communities.

The final lessons support students to pitch their own "Project for Change", with three winning pitches receiving funding and mentorship to make their projects a reality.

CHILDREN'S COMMISSIONER

The Children's Commissioner has a statutory duty to represent the views and interest of children in England to the government. The Commissioner is requesting information from all schools and colleges across the country, under Section 2F of the Children Act 2004. This means that all public sector organisations are legally obliged to submit this data. Independent schools are welcome to submit responses, but the survey is primarily targeted at state schools.

The survey is exploring:

- Staff roles and responsibilities across the school and/or MAT
- Resources available to the school and how they are funded
- Barriers to providing support to pupils in the school
 Support for children with Special Educational Needs or Disabilities (SEND)
- Policing in schools
- School mobile phone policies
- The number of pupils' in the school with various characteristics
- Key issues of concern in your school and local area
 The staff roles who contributed

The deadline for <u>completing the survey</u> is 20th December 2024.

Any school member of staff can contribute but we believe that a member of the Senior Leadership Team (SLT) or the Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL) will be best equipped to answer.

Multiple members of staff can contribute however each school should only respond once. If a schools completes more than one survey, the Children's Commissioner's office will only include the last response in their analysis. You can start, save your progress and return to complete the survey later by clicking 'Save and Continue Later' at the bottom of each survey page. This will send you a link via email to share with colleagues to help assemble the answer's later.

UPDATE FROM LOCAL PARTNERS

VIRTUAL REALITY EDUCATION OPPORTUNITY

The Violence Reduction Alliance has funded SCVYS to explore how virtual reality can be utilised within education settings to help educate children and young people on the risks of carrying a knife, gang culture and criminal exploitation. Last academic year, settings were selected based on thier geographical location, as they were located in areas where their were a higher proportion of knife crime and/or possession of weapon crimes, based on data provided by Staffordshire Police.

This project has now been extended to be available to all education settings on a first-come-firstserved basis until March 31st 2025.

The VR experience workshops are delivered by trained facilitators to groups of no more than 12 students at a time, ideally Years 6-9 (the school is free to choose which year group they feel would benefit most from this resource, if they have more than one year group in this target age range).

Wearing VR headsets, participants face several scenarios, allowing them to make their own decisions and explore potential consequences. The VR experience will take approximately 10 minutes followed by a group discussion of around 45 minutes. The school can select if they choose the knife or the gang package, based upon where they think the need is within their local context and any gaps in their current curriculum provision. The team can do multiple sessions in one day e.g. a drop-down day. Following the VR experience, there are a selection of session resources available for your staff to deliver themselves that further explores the issues and topics raised that can be utilised within your PSHE curriculum.

There is a requirement for staff members (maximum 3, minimum 1), who will be delivering the follow-

up sessions (no more than 3), to attend a training session and take part in the VR experience, this will provide them with the background knowledge of the characters and prepare them to deliver the follow-on sessions. *A member of staff must be in the session* delivered by SCVYS, to help with behaviour management and ensure consistency with the messaging.

LOCAL MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

Finding the right help at the right time to support Children and Young people with their mental health and wellbeing can be confusing, they might need different types of support at different times in their life. Sometimes it might just be about getting a bit of advice or sometimes problems are more serious or don't get better with self-help and need more help such as specialist advice and support.

Staffordshire County Council's Children & Families, Health & Wellbeing Team, have been working with partners to update the interactive map of children and young people's mental health support. This shows the local support available in Staffordshire for children and young people to support their emotional and mental health and wellbeing.

The map can be found on <u>Staffordshire Connects</u> for downloading and printing. We have also added it to our <u>Notice Board pack</u>.

Midlands Partnership University NHS Foundation Trust's (MPFT) Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service (CAMHS) has introduced an <u>updated referral form</u> from 30 September.

Education colleagues are requested to please use this updated form (attached) from this date when making referrals to CAMHS for children and young people registered with GPs in South Staffordshire (Stafford, East Staffordshire, Lichfield, Cannock Chase, Tamworth and South Staffordshire).

The aim of the updated form is to streamline the process for referrers, enabling referrals to be made that contain all the information needed to triage at point of referral. This should reduce the need for clinicians to ask for further information following the commencement of triage. Information in the form should be provided by a professional who has met with the child and family. In order to gain the best understanding of the needs of the child and family, it may be necessary for this form to be completed by one or more professionals, or with liaison between the child's network. It is ideal for a professional who knows the child/family best to complete this form. This could be a school teacher, SENCO or a health and social care professional.

The <u>Kind Minds Newsletter for the Autumn Term</u> has been published, pulling together useful information about children and young people's mental health and emotional wellbeing.

MPFT's <u>Children and Young People Mental Health Participation Service's Newsletter</u> highlights the work the team have been doing and the upcoming opportunities in the south of the county.

New Era Domestic Abuse service have shared their<u>latest bulletin</u> which highlights the Neutral Front Door Service for children and young people received 376 referrals (230 for Staffordshire) between April-June 2024. From these referrals 253 were suported via the Victim Service (146 in Staffordshire) and 29 via the Behaviour Change Service (19 from the county).

New Era is asking for support from partners in securing timely access to be able to work on a oneto-one basis with the child/young person. Appropriate facilties in school are welcomed, noting challenges to maintain engagement during a school holiday period.

ISLAMOPHOBIA MONTH - 1-30 NOV

The Equality Act places a duty on schools to prevent direct and indirect discrimination, harassment and victimisation because of race and ethnicity, religion or belief and other protected characteristics.

The theme for 2024 is "Seeds of Change" which aims to show how small actions can contribute to big change.

Secondary Schools can download resources from the Islamaphobia Awareness website.

<u>Faith in Us</u> is a resource for both primary and secondary teachers for use in the classroom to work with young people and educate about Islamophobia.

These specific resources can be utilised alongside our locally created resources that help children and young people to celebrate our similarities and differences and to recognise what a Hate Crime is please see our <u>Resource Library</u> - Similarities and Differences.

MOVEMBER - 1-30 NOV

Movember is a movement for men's health - mental health and suicide prevetion, testicular and prostate cancer.

Globally, on average 1 man dies by suicide every minute of the day. Papyrus has developed a <u>guide to suicide prevention, intervention and postvention</u> in schools and colleges (registration required).

The <u>National Oak College</u> has a lesson for Year 11 on the causes and symptoms of suicidal thought and examines the support available for those experiencing or likely to experience suidicial thoughts.

The Samaritans have developed <u>DEAL (Developing Emotional Awareness and Listening)</u> a set of free online teahing resources for 14 years and over that have been quaity assured by the PSHE Association.

Orchid has created a <u>package for PSHE sessions</u> for 14-18 years old that increases young people's understand of testicular cancer and gives confidence to seek help. The lesson covers risk factors, signs and symptoms and highlights the importance of self-examination. This resource also has been quality assured by the PSHE Association.

Orchid has other resources around testicular cancer that can be <u>downloaded here.</u>

LUNG CANCER AWARENESS MONTH 1-30 NOV

Macmillan Cancer Support provides lots of information about <u>Lung Cancer</u> <u>Awareness Month.</u>

Smoking is a major risk factor for lung cancer. Smokers are 15 to 30 times more likely to get lung cancer than nonsmokers.

A significant number of children and adolescents around the world face school violence and bullying including cyberbullying, affecting their health, well-being and education as a result.

The <u>Youth Endowment Fund's Education, Children and Violence guidance</u> provides school, college and alternative provision (AP) leaders across England and Wales with five evidence-based recommendations on how to help prevent children's involvement in violence.



The Violence Reduction Alliance's Safer Streets funding enable the Pan-Staffordshire PSHE Education Service and NSPCC's Together4Childhood to create a series of 4 comic books that explored different strands of violence against women and girls. The first in the series "Matilda's Story" explores gender-based bullying and has been designed for 9-11 years old.

The <u>school of Kindess</u> has lesson plans and activities to teach primary-aged children about the importance of kindess and the impact it can have on people's physical and mental health.


WORLD DIABETES DAY - 14 NOV

Millions of people with diabetes face daily challenges managing their condition at home, work and school. Diabetes and well-being is the theme for <u>World Diabetes Day</u> 2024-2026.

St John's Ambulance has a <u>lesson plan</u> designed for secondary schools that help young people to recognise and respond to someone with low blood sugar and to understand the terms hypoglycaemia, hyperglycaemia and diabetes. The lesson plans can be delivered by teachers, higher-level teaching assistants, school nurses and youth leaders who have a current first aid qualification. The first aid qualification must cover the topic you are teaching.

Type 2 Diabetes is a preventable condition so this day can also be linked into healthy eating, physical activity and smoking sessions. Resources on these topics can be found in our <u>Resource Library.</u>

 Sexual violence, abuse and exploitation
