Personal, Social, Health, Economic (PSHE) education helps children and young people to develop the knowledge, skills and attributes they need to thrive as individuals, family members and members of society. The Pan-Staffordshire PSHE Education Service began in December 2021 with the appointment of two PSHE Coordinators for Staffordshire and Stoke-on-Trent . The roles, funded by Staffordshire's Police, Fire & Crime Commissioner's Office, were created to support the development and delivery of age-appropriate, quality, consistent PSHE education across city and county.

The purpose of this report is to demonstrate the progress of the service in year three, spanning the period December 2023-December 2024 and compare this to Year 1 and 2 as outlined in the EOY2 Impact Report.

CONTEXT & BACKGROUND

The Education Act (2002) requires all schools to teach a curriculum that is "broadly based, balanced and meets the needs of pupils'. Schools must promote the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of pupils at the school and of society, and prepare pupils at the school for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of later life".

Since September 2020, Relationships Education, Health Education, and Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) has been compulsory in England. The Department for Education (DfE) advise that this should be taught as part of a wider PSHE curriculum. Schools are expected "to use their PSHE education programme to equip pupils with a sound understanding of risk and with the knowledge and skills necessary to make safe and informed decisions."

Based on this, the Pan-Staffordshire PSHE Education service utilises the PSHE Association framework of planning to ensure consistent learning outcomes based on a broader curriculum than just the statutory guidance, tailoring this to local contextual needs.

The service also recognises the value informal education providers have in this space and so the National Youth Agency curriculum is also utilised.

The service support education settings on over 90 topics relating to the PSHE curriculum from community safety to conflict resolution, diet and nutrition to dental health, puberty to pregnancy.

The PSHE Education service was initially funded for 3 years (Dec 21-Dec 24) by Staffordshire Police, Fire & Crime Commissioners Office.

In September 2024, a further 4 years of funding was confirmed to extend the service to 2028 with the refreshed funding directive giving a priority focus on supporting education settings. This is reflected in the service outcomes which the service will report to Staffordshire Police, Fire & Crime Commissioners Office against.

In the initial 3 years, the Stoke-on-Trent PSHE Coordinator has been hosted by Ormiston Horizon Academy and SASCAL. From December 2024, this post has moved to be hosted by Staffordshire Council of Voluntary Youth Services (SCVYS) which have been the hosts of the Staffordshire post since 2021.



We do this through our service offer, established in the initial 3 years.

PSHE DIGEST

Our monthly newsletter brings together the latest research to ensure local PSHE education is evidence-led, with updates from national and local partners to enable effective signposting and resources to support upcoming key awareness dates. The PSHE Digest provides a round-up to ensure education settings can stay up-to-date with developments.

In Year 3, we have added a further 102 individuals to the mailing list, making the total 991 recipients.

INCREASING TOPIC CONFIDENCE & COMPETENCE

Research consistently shows that children and young people and links." engage and learn more effectively when PSHE sessions are delivered by trained, confident facilitators. To enable practitioners to become more confident we have created our localised "... & PSHE" packs which show the learning outcomes related to the topic and the knowledge required to achieve them. We also invite subject experts to share their expertise and develop links between education and specialist services in our Practice Development Sessions.

WEBSITE & RESOURCE LIBRARY

We have a specific area on our website (sign-up required) that hosts resources that have been quality assured against the local framework. This includes nationally sourced and locally produced resources.

From 391 individuals signed up in Year 2 when the Resource Library was launched, a further 499 users signed up in Year 3 (Dec 23-Dec 24).

PSHE EDUCATION CONFERENCE - NOVEMBER 2024

Funding from the Home Office's Safer Streets 5 provided an opportunity to showcase resources developed by the PSHE Education Service through previous Safer Streets funding and provide education settings with updated knowledge, practical tips and resources for colleagues to take back to their own setting.

PSHE EDUCATION CONFERENCE NOVEMBER 2024

Utilising Safer Streets 5 funding, the Pan-Staffordshire PSHE Education Service hosted it's inaugural conference on 13th November 2024.

The conference objectives were:

- Describe the offer available from the PSHE Education Service
- Build networks with other professionals to support PSHE education in their setting
- Recognise areas of strength and areas for development within their own setting

189 tickets sold to 140 organisations, representing:

Staffordshire:

- 53 Primary Schools representing 23% or more than 1 in 5 (7 did not attend on the day)
- 35 Secondary Schools representing 38% or more than 1 in 2.5 (1 did not attend on the day)
- 13 Independent Schools representing 54% or more than 1 in 2

Stoke-on-Trent

- 9 Primary Schools representing 12% or more than 1 in 10
- 13 Secondary Schools representing 81% or more than 4 in 5.

We also had representatives from alternative providers, youth organisations and external providers not counted in the figures above.
