

WHAT'S OUT THERE


Whilst it is important to ensure PSHE is part of a planned curriculum, it can also be used to address needs in a local context and form part of conversations we have with children and young people about their experiences and what's happening in the world around them.

We have collated some examples of topics that are being covered in TV and media that young people may want to discuss.

- <u>Stacey Dooley's documentary Growing Up Gypsy</u> has caused discussions online. The programme gives viewers an insight into the lives of Romany women as they navigate everyday life. The show comes as the charity Friends, Families and Travellers (FFT) - an organisation working to end discrimination against the Gypsy, Roma and Traveller (GRT) community - says it regularly hears from Romany Gypsy women who feel pressure to hide their identity in professional or public spaces to avoid discrimination and hate. June hosts Gypsy, Roma and Traveller history month see page 17</u> for suggestions on how your setting can work to ensure this culture is recognised. We've added this documentary to our <u>website</u>.
- Sean "Diddy" Combs, a name long associated with global music success and entrepreneurial spirit, now finds himself confronting serious criminal charges, including racketeering and sex trafficking, alongside numerous civil lawsuits. This stark contrast between his public image and current legal battles forms the core of a new <u>BBC documentary</u>.
- Channel 4 aired <u>Groomed: A National Scandal</u> which is available online. The documentary features 5 young women who survived unimaginable abuse and rape tell their stories of a gang grooming spanning 20 years.
- A <u>change in law</u> from the Spanish government means that schools, in Spain, will need to change their school meals to healthier options.
- The Pope died on Easter Monday. The <u>Catholic Agency for Overseas</u> <u>Development (CAFOD)</u> has developed resources for schools to remember Pope Francis.
- The <u>Supreme Court ruled</u> that in the Equality Act 2010, 'sex' means biological sex. This <u>article by Schools Week</u> shares some thoughts on what this means for school leads. The <u>EHRC published non-statutory guidance</u> that has received <u>criticism from The Green Party</u>.
- Jess Phillips MP gave a <u>speech on the government's plan</u> to tackle child sexual abuse and exploitation.
- <u>Call of Duty maker</u> has defended the game's impact on young men stating that they are "not here to dictate anything other than an outlet for enjoyment and entertainment for a player".

UPDATE FROM NATIONAL PARTNERS

STATUTORY RSHE IMPACT

We know there is great work happening locally to keep improving PSHE education, the numbers of you that engage with the PSHE Education Service in different ways, enable us to showcase your commitment and passion across the partnership. A report from the <u>Higher Education Policy</u> <u>Institute</u> (HEPI) think tank, published in February 2025, includes polling data from Savanta, which surveyed 1,105 university students. The findings reveal that nearly half (47%) of the students feel well prepared for sex and relationships in higher education, a significant increase from just 27% who felt well prepared when asked the same question in 2021. This suggests the bringing in statutory elements to the curriculum has had a positive impact. The majority of respondents supported PSHE being studied until the age of 18.

The report also highlights that university students, when asked what they would like to add the most popular response, by a considerable margin was financial education. Sometimes this was in the context of 'life skills'.

"Basic life skills – finances, savings, taxes, insurance etc writing a CV, applying for jobs, potential career paths."

This reminds us of the messaging shared by Staffordshire Youth Union at our conference and Oli stating he didn't know that the E stood for 'economic' and not 'education'.

The poll also asked young people about the value of different aspects of their PSHE curriculum, which areas they found helpful and what they wanted more of. There was no one area which a majority found helpful, but moderate support for several areas, and the vast majority (86%) found at least 1 aspect helpful (page 38).

Last year we shared with you the findings of the <u>Sex Education Forum's poll</u> which also suggests recent improvements. 50% of respondents rated the quality of their school RSE as 'good' or 'very good' - up 10 percentage points from the 40% who said as much when asked the same question in a 2022 poll.

Children and young people are our most important critics of the work we do and it is essential that we hear their voice. <u>Our guidance pack</u> provides ideas and suggestions on how you can ensure you are capturing their experiences. We know many of you already talk to your school councils and do these activities, as our survey shows 47% of those who have already completed our survey do engage with children and young people and during our school visits you tell us about the incredible work you are doing. Let's give ourselves more opportunities to celebrate the work we do and make PSHE in Staffordshire and Stoke-on-Trent even better.

YOUTH VIOLENCE

The Youth Select Committee, an initiative led by the National Youth Agency, has <u>published a new</u> <u>report</u> investigating the impact of social media on youth violence. The report draws on evidence submissions from professionals, youth organisations, and young people. The Committee aimed to understand young people's experiences of violence both online and offline, exploring the need for regulation of social media, youth services and preventative work, the role of schools in teaching online safety, and the role of the police. The Committee's report calls for tech companies to do more to protect young people from violent and harmful online content and to be held accountable.

The report states that "while these [teachers, social workers, and other youth practitioners] understand the importance of online safety, many feel that they do not have the right tools or knowledge to teach media literacy topics, including through statutory RSHE. Internet Matters published a <u>Vision for Media Literacy</u> in June 2024 called for media literacy to be incorporated into Initial Teacher Training to provide a foundation of knowledge and confidence as well as through Continuing Professional Development to ensure that teachers can adapt to teach emerging threats and trends.

The McPin Foundation has released a <u>new report</u> exploring young people's views on how schools can help protect young people from youth violence. Young peer researchers interviewed and held focus groups with 12 to 23-year-olds in and around London to explore their experiences with school exclusions. The findings showed that exclusions often lead to negative emotions like anger, anxiety, and stress, and may push young people towards violence. The report urges schools to involve young people in discussions and decision-making about exclusions and youth violence.

The government has decided to <u>ban ninja swords and implement Ronan's Law</u>. From 1st August it will be illegal to possess, manufacture, import or sell ninja swords. The majority of ninja swords have a blade between 14-24 inches with one straight curing edge with a tanto-style point. From 1st August, anyone caught in possession of a ninja sword in private could face 6 months in prison, and this will later increase to 2 years under new measures in the Crime and Policing Bill. There is already a penalty of up to 4 years in prison for carrying any weapon in public.

The government will run a surrender scheme throughout July to allow any member of the public to hand in these weapons safely. We will share more information about how this will work locally when we have it.

ONLINE SAFETY

Ofcom has <u>published the final version</u> of its Protection of Children Codes and Guidance which will apply to online services and platform providers likely to be used by children in the UK.

<u>Child safety measures</u> aimed at protecting children from harmful online content will require online service providers to complete and record risk assessments by 24 July 2025. From 25 July 2025, they must implement safety measures outlined in Ofcom's Codes, including safer feeds with algorithms filtering harmful content, effective age checks, and processes to quickly address harmful content. Non-compliance with the Online Safety Act can result in fines or court orders to block sites or apps in the UK. Ofcom's decisions are detailed in five volumes, along with regulatory documents and guidance.

The Guardian has <u>published a news story</u> highlighting findings from an analysis of children's smartphone and social media use, as featured in the British Medical Journal (BMJ). The <u>BMJ article</u> raises concerns about blanket bans on smartphone use and explores several key areas: a rights-based approach, age-appropriate smartphone and social media design, and the education provided by schools and families.

In 2024<u>a survey found</u> that 1 in 3 teenagers use TikTok as their main source of health information. The same survey found that 1 in 11 experienced health issues after following health advice on the social media platform. This also highlights why it is important that all phases of education and all types of education settings equip children and young people with the critical literacy skills that they need to survive and thrive in a digital world. Here are some resources you might useful for your own curriculum:

- The <u>National Literacy Trust</u> has some resources for parents/carers, primary and secondary schools. Please note sign-up is required.
- <u>Digital Matters</u> has resources for parents/carers and those who work with 9-11 years old that uses interactive lesson and dynamic storytelling sign-up required.
- Newswise has lesson plans, activities and teacher guidance for 7-11 years old
- <u>Media Smart</u> has resources for 7+ years explore topics such as advertising, digital advertising, body image, social media, influencer marketing and creative careers.
- <u>BBC Bitesize's Other Side of the Story</u> helps young people to navigate fake news and misinformation and be more critical and curious about what they see and share online.
- Google has a <u>Interland Reality River Game</u> to help children and young people navigate fake news and misinformation.

<u>Childnet has developed a collection of activities</u> to use with young people aged 13-18 that explores life online for women and girls. These resources were developed for International Women's Day but are suitable for use all year round. They can be used with young people of all genders.

SEXUALISED BEHAVIOURS

According to <u>The Guardian,</u> information from <u>Everyone's Invited</u> reveals that anonymous reports of sexual harassment, groping, inappropriate touching, sexual assault, and rape have been made at 1,664 primary schools across the UK.

We have also been contacted by local primary schools who are identifying problematic or harmful sexualised behaviours in their pupils, requesting support, so we appreciate this is not just a national issue, but something happening locally.

The report, which some people may find distressing, includes a quote from Daniel Kebede the general secretary of the National Education Union (NEU) which says:

"Primary school teachers are reporting that sexist behaviour is happening in their schools. It affects the way that children play together and how girls feel about themselves and the place they have in the world."

It is important to remember that PSHE assists universal prevention via a spiral curriculum. It should be suitable and relevant to all pupils in the group. PSHE , in itself, is not an intervention, unless further work is done with a targeted or identified group of children and young people which is further to the general curriculum.

Professionals can protect children and young people from harm by changing expectations, challenging unacceptable behaviour and improving children and young people's knowledge and understanding of healthy relationships. Within a whole-school approach, PSHE Leads are responsible for implementing an evidence-based programme throughout the curriculum, reflecting core values and standards, supported by behaviour policies and pastoral care.

Content must be age-appropriate and consider the needs of those children and young people with SEND. Topics may include:

- Healthy and respectful relationships
- Recognising respectful behaviour
- Consent
- Gender roles, stereotyping, and equality
- Body confidence and self-esteem
- Prejudiced behaviour
- Recognising that sexual violence and harassment are always wrong
- Addressing cultures of sexual harassment
- Tackling misogyny

Good practice includes providing an open forum for discussion and ensuring children and young people know how to raise concerns and make reports. You may wish to utilise the locally produced comic books, there are still a limited number of printed copies. To request <u>email the service</u>.

SEXUAL ABUSE

The Centre of Expertise on Child Sexual Abuse (CSA Centre) has <u>released a report</u> revealing that child sexual abuse in the UK is more common than commonly perceived, often involving individuals that children know and trust. It emphasises that many children who are sexually abused remain unidentified and unsupported. While any child can be sexually abused, certain children are more vulnerable to this abuse than others. It provides resources to assist parents /carers and professionals working with children.

NSPCC Learning has published a '<u>Why language matters' blog</u> exploring why it can be difficult for children to share their concerns and how professionals can approach conversations about concerns of child sexual abuse with children and with other professionals.. The blog is in response to the <u>Child Safeguarding Practice Review Panel's National review</u> into child sexual abuse in the family environment.

In 2024, the <u>IWF assessed</u> 424,047 reports, confirming 291,273 contained or linked to criminal child abuse imagery, a 6% increase from 2023. There is a rise in abuse imagery of teenagers and concerns about online exploitation.

Research reinforces that PSHE education is an essential safeguarding tool and plays a crucial role in helping children recognise safe and unsafe relationships, identify abusive behaviours, and build the confidence to seek support if they experience or witness abuse.

- A <u>2017 report by Public Health England</u> on child sexual exploitation (CSE) highlighted the critical role of PSHE and RSE in addressing these issues.
- A <u>2015 Cochrane review</u> found that children who receive education on preventing sexual abuse at school are more likely to report it to an adult if they experience or witness abuse.
- In September 2024, the Department for Education (DfE) published a research report titled "<u>Teaching Relationships Education to Prevent Sexual Abuse</u>." The report emphasised the importance of a well-rounded, inclusive RSE curriculum that fosters healthy, respectful relationships and helps children and young people recognise and report abusive behaviour. It recommended that age-appropriate relationships education should begin early, before sexual activity starts, and build progressively as children and young people advance through their education. The evidence suggests that education that builds on previous lessons and has a longer duration is more effective than one-off modules.

The Centre of Expertise on Child Sexual Abuse (CSA Centre) has updated its <u>guidance on</u> <u>communicating with children who have or may have been sexually abused</u>. The guide has been designed to help professionals to listen, understand and provide support to children and young people when there are concerns about sexual abuse.

DOMESTIC ABUSE

The National Policing Vulnerability Knowledge & Practice Programme has released its <u>fourth</u> <u>annual report</u> on domestic abuse-related deaths identified by police in England and Wales. Key findings include:

- 262 domestic abuse-related deaths were recorded between April 2023 and March 2024.
- 11 of these deaths involved children under 16 years old.
- In 81% of child deaths from 2020-2024, the suspect was the victim's carer.

• In 20% of all cases from 2020-2024, the victim or suspect were known to children's social care. The report suggests that the relatively small number of reported child deaths is due to the classification of these deaths as child abuse or familicide rather than domestic abuse. It recommends that police should consider whether young people, including those under 16, may be experiencing domestic abuse and/or coercive control in their relationships. This necessitates collaboration with partner agencies such as social care and education.

In Staffordshire and Stoke-on-Trent, the latest bulletin from New Era showed that they have had 1,744 referrals into their Neutral Front Door (612 for Stoke-on-Trent and 1,132 from Staffordshire). From this 1,462 (518 Stoke-on-Trent, 944 Staffordshire) were placed on the Supported Victim Service pathway and 218 on the Supported Behaviour Change (79 Stoke-on-Trent, 139 Staffordshire).

We also know many of you also receive Operation Encompass notifications, which also highlights how many of our children and young people are impacted by Domestic Abuse,

Research highlights that PSHE is an effective safeguarding tool to help reduce domestic abuse as shown below.

- The <u>Youth Endowment Fund (YEF) Toolkit</u> research found that relationship violence prevention lessons and activities can reduce all types of dating and relationship violence, including emotional, physical and sexual violence, and violence that takes place online.
- A <u>systematic literature review</u> of school-based RSE by Goldfarb and Lieberman (2021) found strong evidence that it can reduce sexual violence and domestic violence.



The <u>National Institute of Health and Social Care</u> researched 39,214 young people aged 16-19 from the UK, US and Canada and found that those who vaped were more likely to have breathing issues than those who did not and the more they vaped, the higher their chance of breathing issues.

Remember that from 1st June 2025 it <u>will be illegal</u> for businesses to sell or supply, offer to sell or supply, or have in their possession for sale or supply all single use vape products.

EXPLOITATION

Childlight has just <u>released a new report in its Searchlight series</u>, exploring child sexual exploitation and abuse. The report covers eight studies and focuses on three main areas:

- who profits from this exploitation,
- hidden at-risk groups,
- accountability, including the
- legal challenges of dealing with AI-generated child abuse material in the UK.

The findings show a disturbing connection between child exploitation and organised crime groups. It also points out that mainstream tech companies can profit from this, as their ad revenue goes up with increased traffic, even if that traffic is linked to child abuse content.

The report urges global leaders to unite and create a strong public health response to tackle child sexual exploitation and abuse.

The top 3 choices remained the top 3 most popular choices.

Football Club, self-employed and government were all new entries. The NHS retained the top stop whilst Google moved from 2nd to 3^{rd,} swapping places with Apple.

The survey will take about 15 minutes and you can share as much or as little information as you like.





This training will give you the tools to help create a safe and supportive environment where LGBTQ+ youth can thrive.

ACTIVE LIVES SURVEY



<u>Together Active</u>, the Active Partnership for Staffordshire and Stoke-on-Trent, are working on behalf of Sport England on the <u>Active Lives Children and Young People Survey</u>, to build collective understanding of the attitudes and behaviours of children and young people towards sport and physical activity.

Not only will this help inform what PE Leads can be doing within the school to support their children and young people to be active, it also provides decision makers with a broad and deep understanding of activity levels and behaviours, to help shape future policy and investment decisions, and also can help to support cross-curriculum learning with PSHE.

The survey was developed with the Department for Education (DfE), the Department of Health and Social Care and the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport.

Any school can take part, and those that do, you have the opportunity to receive:

- a bespoke report for your school based on the survey responses about activity levels, and children's feelings and attitudes to physical activity
- a <u>Healthy Schools Rating</u> from the DfE

In addition, schools sampled by Sport England who agree to participate, also have the opportunity to receive £100 of free sports equipment.

Create the Conditions has been created by Plan International UK and She is Not Your Rehab as a resource to help professionals foster safe, respectful, and trauma-informed environments. These spaces allow young people to discuss gender, power, and equality. The resource includes eight modules and a workbook designed to equip practitioners with the knowledge and skills to be positive role models and facilitate conversations that challenge attitudes and behaviours contributing to gender-based violence.



TRANSITIONS

We know that many education settings will be supporting their children and young people to transition to the next phase of their education journey or beyond. This could be from infant or first school to junior school, first school to middle school, primary to secondary, middle school to high school, secondary school to college, and beyond. Here are some suggestions to support you during the transition season.

- <u>Anna Freud</u> has an animation and accompanying teacher toolkit aimed at supporting young people who have recently started, or are due to start shortly Year 7.
- <u>Childsnet</u> has a toolkit with videos and lesson plans to help young people aged 10-13 years old with the online aspects of moving to secondary school
- The <u>Department of Health and Social Care</u> has developed a lesson to support transitioning to secondary school
- <u>Gloucestershire Healthy Living and Learning</u> has some suggested resources that support transition to secondary school
- Advise and activities from <u>ELSA Support</u> to use with children making any kind of transition to a new school or class- whether that's moving from infant to juniors or primary to secondary school or from one class to another. Please note there is a charge associated with thee resources

You may want to utilise books from our <u>Books & PSHE document</u> you could consider:

- <u>Mixed</u> by Arree Chung, help the group think about how their classroom can be an accepting and inclusive place to learn and grow.
- <u>They</u> by Chantal Reardon, use to explore pressure to fit in and making choices
- <u>The Friendship Bench</u> by Wendy Meddour and Daniel Egneus, shows the difference that making friends can have, could be used to encourage children to reflect on how to make new or isolated members of the school community welcome.

You could use activities such as

- "Getting to know you bingo" we have a version of this in <u>our Similarities and</u> <u>Differences</u> teacher's pack for KS1.
- Have children or young people write a letter to their future teacher, sharing their expectations, fears and hops.
- Utilise your question boxes and have everyone write down a question they have about the new school year and put it in the box. If they do not have a question say to just write "I do not have a question". Mix up all the questions and then answer them to the whole group.

PRIDE MONTH - 1-30 JUNE

Pride Month is a time to celebrate the LGBTQ+ community and their achievements, while also advocating for their rights and equality. It's a period of parades, rallies, and events aimed at promoting self-acceptance, visibility, and solidarity within the LGBTQ+ community. The origins of Pride Month can be traced back to the Stonewall Riots in 1969, a pivotal event in the LGBTQ+ rights movement.

A <u>2019 report</u> showed that being bullied for being LGBTQ+ is more common than bullying relating to racism, sexism or religion. <u>Stop Hate UK report</u> that LGBTQI+ Hate Crime reports have nearly tripled in the last 3 years and in 2020/2021 over 17,135 people from the LGBTQI+ reported they were the victims of hate crimes to the police. Our <u>Bitesize Practice Development</u> <u>Session with United Staffordshire Against Hate on Homophobia & PSHE</u> is available to watch on our YouTube page.

Learning about LGBTQ+ Pride should take the form of a spiral curriculum which integrates topics throughout the school years, revisiting them with increasing complexity and depth, ensuring they are age-appropriate and build upon prior knowledge.

As a service, we've created a <u>card match activity for LGBTQ+ terminology and definitions</u> which can be used in classrooms (KS3+) or with staff as part of CPD.

GYPSY, ROMA AND TRAVELLER HISTORY MONTH - 1-30 JUNE

It is important the PSHE education reflects the lives and experiences of the children and young people it is engaging. Many Gypsy, Roma and Traveller young people feel that their culture and way of life is not recognised or affirmed within the education system.

<u>The Traveller Movement website</u> contains lots of information and suggestions for promoting Gypsy, Roma and Traveller History Month within your organisation.

<u>Friends, Families and Travellers provide teaching resources</u> including books and media to support bringing Gypsy, Roma and Traveller histories and cultures into the classroom.

WORLD ENVIRONMENT DAY - 5 JUNE

<u>World Environment Day 2025</u> calls for collective action to tackle plastic pollution. The UK experiences significant plastic pollution, with an estimated 1.7 billion pieces of plastic discarded weekly by households. This translates to around 90 billion pieces annually.

<u>Countryside Classroom</u> can share various resources that can be emailed to you following sign up including Plastics, The Environment and Climate Change. These are suitable for ages 5-11 years old.

<u>Recycle Now have resources</u>, including assemblies, lesson plans and home challenges which have been developed in partnership with teachers. The materials support children to explore what it means to be an active citizen, why recycling matters, and how recycling works.

BRAKE'S KIDS WALK - 11 JUNE

Brake's Kids Walk involves thousands of primary schoolchildren walking at the same time to promote the health and planetsaving benefits of walking and shout out for their right to make safe and healthy journeys.

More than 79,000 children aged 4-11 took part in Brake's Kids Walk 2024.

You can <u>sign-up</u> to take part in 2025 and receive your FREE action pack (Printed packs while stocks last), including lesson plans, assemblies, activities and posters.

WORLD BLOOD DONOR DAY - 14 JUN

The NHS needs 3 blood donations every minute to handle emergencies, childbirth, and critical treatments.

We have a dedicated area to Organ, Blood and Stem Cell Donation within our <u>Resource</u> <u>Library</u>, this contains resources from Team Margot, NHS Blood & Transplant (NHSBT) for ages 5-16 years old.

A DAY OF WELCOME - 13 JUNE

Schools of Sanctuary and Anglia Ruskin University have worked closely in the last 5 years to develop <u>A Day of Welcome</u> – an annual day of learning and solidarity inspired by stories of refugee migration that raises awareness of refugee history and heritage, past and present, local and global.

Celebrated by more than 550 schools in 2024, the day aims to support teachers to develop refugee education in schools and kickstart Refugee Week (16-22 June 2025) by providing FREE live events, resources and activities for teachers and pupils of all ages.

REFUGEE WEEK - 16-22 JUNE

Unicef has a <u>series of assemblies for Primary schools</u> which focus on various articles of the Convention and links them to events and days of recognition. An assembly for World Refugee Day is found on Page 53 and explores:

- Article 7 Children have the right to acquire a nationality and, as far as possible, the right to know and be cared for by their parents.
- Article 22 Children who are refugees have the right to special protection and help. Refugee children are entitled to all the rights in the Convention wherever they are.
- Article 38 Children in war zones should receive special protection.

The British Red Cross is hosting an <u>online showcase event</u> on 13th May 4-6pm that will provide information and resources to help schools celebrate this week.

NATIONAL SELFIE DAY - 21 JUNE

Whilst the messaging of National Selfie Day is to "snap a pic of yourself and post it social media" we can use this key date to explore ways to keep safe online including youth produced imagery.

The Centre for Literacy in Primary Education produced some <u>teaching notes</u> (suitable for 8-13 year olds) for Safer Internet Day using the book "Troll Stinks" which explores online safety, selfies and mobile phones.

We have previously shared a Comic book, animation and accompanying lesson plan, as part of our VAWG series, developed with The Staffordshire Violence Reduction Alliance that explores the impact of photo sharing. These are available in the <u>Resource Library</u> in Online Safety. For KS3+, the <u>Childnet Sexting - "Just send it" lesson and accompanying film</u> explores the issue of sexting.

SCHOOL DIVERSITY WEEK - 23-27 JUNE

School Diversity Week is a UK-wide celebration of LGBT+ equality in primary and secondary schools.

Positive LGBT+ messaging is linked to school pupils having <u>better wellbeing</u>, regardless of whether they're LGBT+ or not. Just Like Us, an LGBTQ+ Young People's Charity provide free educational LGBT+ resources for EYFS, KS1, KS2 and KS4 on all key subjects across the curriculum.

DROWNING PREVENTION DAY - 25 JUNE

Across Staffordshire, there are several rivers, lakes, canals that could be risky. PSHE Leads should ensure that their curriculum reflects local risks and ensure that there are opportunities for children and young people to develop the knowledge and skills on how to manage risks. This includes risks around playing near water or on frozen water, how to keep safe in and around water. Our <u>Water Safety & PSHE professionals</u> guidance pack is part of the Pan-staffordshire PSHE Education Service's localised series and shows the curriculum learning outcomes linked to Water Safety, and gives information to enable professionals to build their own knowledge on the topic to competently facilitate PSHE sessions with confidence. This, and other resources to support you cover this topic can be found in the Water safety area of the <u>Resource Library</u>.

RSE DAY - 26 JUNE

RSE Day will be celebrated on 26 June with the theme of 'Communicate'.

RSE Day is a day to celebrate great education around healthy relationships and positive sexual health.

Schools and organisations around the country join in the celebration with activities and sharing on social media. RSE helps children to make informed choices and stay safe.
